Avoid the use of	Prefer use of
Handicapped ramp, bathroom	Accessible entrance, bathroom
Crippled, handicapped, physically challenged, differently abled	Person with a disability
Normal person	Sighted, hearing, ambulatory, non-disabled Person
The blind, the deaf, the disabled	.Do not "clump" people into a category Avoid using such phrases altogether
Deaf and Dumb	.Deaf, hard-of-hearing, difficulty with speech
Victim of, suffers from, afflicted with	Person <i>has</i> multiple sclerosis, spinal cord Injury, cerebral palsy, etc.
Wheelchair-bound, confined to	Uses a wheelchair
Epileptic, diabetic, spastic	Person <i>has</i> epilepsy, diabetes, Neurological disorder
Retarded	Developmental disability
Courageous, inspiring	Do not use when referring to a person
Special person, Special needs	Use only if part of a title (Special Assistant To the Director). A person with a disability May need an accommodation, adaptive Device or assistive technology
Patient	Person, consumer, customer, etc.  Patient can only be used in a medical Situation
