Parish Contacts / Advocates

Who is a Parish Advocate?

- The Parish Contact acts on behalf of persons with disabilities to ensure that all are invited to share in the life of the parish.
- ➤ The contact serves as liaison between persons with disabilities and their parish and between the parish and the Archdiocesan Office for Persons with Disabilities.

Individuals with Disabilities Categories of

Disability Under IDEA /Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders (DSM-5)

AUTISM

1 in 59 or 1.7 % of the children (1 in 38 boys/ 1 in 152 girls)

Intellectual Disability

Formally called MR. 1.5 %- 2.5% Roughly 1 in 50

Traumatic Brain Injury

Ages 0-4 and 15-19 most at risk In the fall of 2011, nearly 26,000 school-aged children - Special Ed for TBI

Psychiatric Disability Mental Iliness Behavioral Health

1 in 5 Children ages 9 to 17 1 in 4 adults (26%) 1 in 17 (6%) Serious Disorder

Children with Disabilities - IDEA

- The student must meet one of the 13 disability categories defined by the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, 2004 (IDEA).
- The student must need special education; that is, the child requires specifically designed instruction to receive educational benefits

13 categories are:

- Intellectual Disability (ID formally MR)
- Hearing impairment
- Speech/language impairment
- Visual impairment / Blind
- Emotional disturbance
- Orthopedic impairment

- Autism
- Traumatic brain injury
- Other health impairment
- Specific learning disability
- Deafness
- Deaf-blindness
- Multiple disabilities

OPD / Office for Persons with Disabilities

The Department serves as a pastoral resource for parishes, institutions, families and individuals in providing access and welcome to persons with disabilities.

■ About 18-20 % or about 1 in 5 of our Catholic parishioners live with a disability.







Physical Accessibility of Churches

- 206 of our 216 Parishes have Accessible Churches.- (95%)
- In 1991 when the office was formed less than 50% of Church buildings were accessible.



Role of Parish Contact



➤ The contact/ advocate serves as a liaison between persons (and families) with disabilities, and their parish and between the parish and the diocesan Office of Disability Ministry.

General Principals - GCS 2017

- Full accessibility should be the goal for every parish, and these adaptations are to be an ordinary part of the liturgical life of the parish.
- The creation of a fully accessible parish reaches beyond mere physical accommodation to encompass the attitudes of all parishioners toward persons with disabilities. All members of the faith community have a role to play in the invitation, welcome, and inclusion of people with disabilities.

What are some ways your parish may need to prepare and plan?

Planning





If the participation of persons with disabilities and their families is to be real and meaningful, the parish must prepare itself to receive them (1978 Pastoral Statement #19) I do believe my role and also having a Parish Advisory Committee on Disabilities makes the parish more aware of the needs of Persons with disabilities.

- Awareness
- Helping to identify individuals and families
- INVITING
- Building access gradual improvement
- Transportation issues
- Increasing Participation and Service
- Integral part of Parish decision making





Parish Contact/Advocate

Strategies:

- Build relationships
- Identify who are the families and individuals
- Keep communication open...listen.
- Involve individuals in decision making...don't presume you know what is best.
- Offer resources, training and assistance / be a model of inclusion
- Be involved in the liturgy; it is where you'll reach the most people.

From my perspective my greatest influence has been on the Parish Religious Education Program. Children with disabilities are in the mainstream, in smaller learning support programs, instructed at home when necessary. Their needs are met in a variety of way.

- A resource to families and to the parish staff
- Assisted in navigating access to the Sacraments
- Physical changes pew cuts and a ramp to the Lounge
- Bringing needs to the Parish Council
- Sometimes just listening and offering support ,understanding



Physical /Architectural

- Accessible entrances / doors
- Pew Cuts
- Parking
- Assistive Listening Devices
- Accessible Sanctuaries, choir area, confessionals
- Large Print / Braille



Attitudinal / A culture of belonging

- Ministry of Hospitality
- Children and Adults with IDD/ASD / MI feel welcome and accepted
- Accommodations are not a problem
- Recognition of the gifts and blessings of persons with disabilities.




